Community profile Redwood

Census area units: Redwood North, Redwood South, Styx Mill



The Redwood area includes Redwood North, South and Styx Mill, covering a total area of 4.0943 square kilometres and is situated approximately 7.8 kilometres north of the Christchurch Central Business District (CBD). Redwood was originally named Styx, but was re-named Redwood in the 1960s when the local residents voted to rename Redwood after a Sequoia redwood tree that still stands in Prestons Road. Redwood was seen as a farming area of Christchurch when first settled; it is now made up of a mixture of rural land where market farms are run, light industrial areas and older and newer residential suburbs.

The schools located in Redwood are Redwood Primary School, Northcote Primary School and St Bede's College. Redwood hosts five preschools and Plunket rooms. The majority of these sites are located on Main North Road in Redwood.

Main North Road is a four lane road that is one of the main thoroughfares for traffic travelling north of the city. Main North Road cuts through the middle of Redwood. There is a small business village within Redwood located on Main North Road.

Redwood hosts 12 parks and reserves, including Redwood Park, Owen Mitchell Park and Murchison Park. Redwood has its own community radio station called Good Music FM 107.5 (formerly know as Radio Redwood).

The area's total population in the 2013 Census data is 10,149 and Redwood is estimated to grow to 11,090 by 2031, which is not significant due to minimal available land for future development.

The median age for Redwood residents is 41.9 years which is higher compared with the median age across the city of 38.6 years. In Redwood, 14.3 per cent of the population is aged over 65 years, which is slightly lower than the regional average.

Community infrastructure mapping



The above ratings have been based on reach, diversity and participation. For example, bigger circles tend to be groups that provide a wider range of services, or have large numbers of participants. They also tend to be groups that are well networked within the community.

Redwood has a varied and well-populated social infrastructure. There are 39 identified groups that make up the social infrastructure, comprising seven community organisations, 12 sports organisations, 15 recreational/leisure groups, one residents' group and four meeting venues.

Strong groups can be found across sectors, with meeting venues having high reach and impact across the zone. There are a large number of groups in the recreational/leisure and sports sectors which have noticeably more reach across the zone.

Community environment

Social environment

Redwood is situated between Papanui and Belfast. The majority of residents shop and seek activities and services outside of this immediate area. Redwood has an active social, hobby and sporting community and is made up primarily of residential dwellings. Redwood boasts six parks and 12 reserves, providing many opportunities to participate and enjoy the outdoors.

The earthquakes have caused no apparent change in the capacity of the organised community infrastructure in the Redwood zone. Churches report that their facilities are now at capacity as groups and organisations from other parts of the city seek accommodation. In particular, St Silas Anglican and St Lukes Presbyterian churches are accommodating a number of Bishopdale/Papanui groups and others from around the city. This includes another church currently sharing the facility at St Lukes Presbyterian church due to earthquake issues. This has increased the number of programmes being offered to the Redwood community.

The two primary schools, Northcote and Redwood, are situated within the area and provide a strong focus for Redwood children and families, as does St Bede's College. They are all working with the local community and sharing resources. Most local primary students will go on to attend Papanui High School.

Redwood Library and Redwood Park are a focal point for the community. The Redwood Library provides significant support and information for the local community and remains a well-used facility for all ages of this community.

Built environment

The earthquakes impacted slightly on the Redwood area with minimal liquefaction and damage to roads. Businesses were quick to reopen and essential services are all functioning. Moderate damage was reported, however, many homes lost their chimneys and fences.

Christchurch City Council provides social housing for 76 people and 199 Housing New Zealand units/properties. Most of this stock is undamaged and remains operational.

The two major facilities in Redwood are the two churches: St Silas Anglican and St Lukes Presbyterian. There is also a community lounge at one of the Council housing facilities that is well used by small local groups meeting on a weekly basis. As mentioned, the Redwood Library is also well utilised by the Redwood community.

The Northern Rail Route cycleway was extended in early 2013 to create a direct cycleway from Redwood through to South Hagley Park and the central city. This is providing an avenue for those living in Redwood to connect with schools and local centres through the use of cycling.

The Northern Arterial Motorway will positively affect Redwood residents, as presently northern commuters use Main North Road as part of the commute between Christchurch Central Business District and the northern suburbs. With the construction of the Northern Arterial Motorway, traffic will bypass Main North Road and commuters will travel through the eastern side of Redwood. This will be a relief for all those parents that cross the Main North Road at peak times with their families going to school and preschools.

Economic environment

According to the Real Estate Institute of New Zealand, 53 dwellings were sold in the REINZ Northern Inner area (this also includes Belfast, Papanui, Redwood and Bishopdale). The median price rose from \$289,000 for the year ending September 2012 to \$420,000 for 2013. This is greater than the 13 per cent increase reported by Quotable Value for house values in 2013.

The latest figures released on in the real estate market for September and November 2013 showed that 26 properties were sold in Redwood (excluding Regents Park and Redwood Springs) and the median sale price was \$372,850.



In 2006, there were 587 businesses with 1420 employees within the Redwood profile area. This is compared with 2013, where there were 685 businesses with 1900 employees. The increase may be credited to the development of the small business park development in Redwood off Cavendish Road that started in 2007.

Local businesses are mainly based in Main North Road within the intersections of Daniels and Prestons Roads. However, there is a large industrial park along Sturrocks Road and Cavendish Road that hosts both large industrial organisations as well as small to medium sized businesses.

Access to local services is limited in Redwood and residents travel to Belfast or Papanui to meet their individual needs.

Natural environment

Redwood has six parks and 12 reserves, providing many opportunities to participate and enjoy the outdoors. As Redwood is broken into two sides with the Main North Road running through the middle, there are three significant parks; Owen Mitchell Park and Murchison Parks situated on the eastern side of Redwood and Redwood Park is situated on the western side. There are a large number of reserves including the Styx Mill Conservation Reserve. A portion of Styx River Mill Conservation Reserve sits within the north-east boundary of the Redwood profile area; this portion of the reserve has Redwood Springs within it. Prestons Creek runs through the eastern side of Redwood, this natural resource runs mainly underground.

Land condition

Technical category two (TC2) - Minor to moderate land damage from liquefaction is possible in future significant earthquakes. Repair / rebuild process can begin.

Technical category three (TC3) - Moderate to significant land damage from liquefaction is possible in future significant earthquakes. Repair / rebuild process can begin on buildings that do not require foundation repair or rebuild. Site-specific investigation is required for those that do.

Following the land announcements on 28 October 2011, the Department of Building and Housing (DBH) technical classifications have classified some residential properties as technical category two (TC2, yellow) and technical category three (TC3, blue).

North of Redwood Park are pockets of land zoned technical category three (TC3) situated within Regents Park Drive, Main North Road, Barnes Road, Canberra Place and south of Murchison Park around Solomon Avenue, Wakelin Place, Denniston Crescent, Jenkins Avenue and Prestons Road.

Staff in 2014 will continue ongoing work with the local Salvation Army who is keen to continue working in Redwood in 2014.
