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The student's experiences have led to deep learning and an even deeper commitment to sharing their knowledge of our river, and sustaining it as a community resource.

Values-based approach

Whanaungatanga – The student leaders have formed a team and developed a tikanga – the students take turns delivering a shared karakia at the beginning of any meeting.

Kaitiakitanga - the student leaders show respect for the places, are learning about the cultural narrative of the place, or living things and taking action.

Rangatiratanga - All five schools will monitor drains for litter and use this as a tool for advocacy encouraging local businesses that border the awa to change their waste practices.



2020 March

- Hīkoi from Ngā Puna Wai to Ihutai along the awa with 16 student leaders, four teachers, nine family members, 13 community representatives sharing values and awareness, taking micro-actions.
- Field trip to Pūharakekenui/Styx River to showcase a long-running community riverside project, 10 SLT, plus three additional students from Thorrington plus six community representatives.
- Pechakucha information evening with four experts presenting to eight SLT, one teacher and parents.

2020 July

- Students identify their passion projects: e.g. photo competition, stormwater litter traps.
- Co-ordinator and student leaders present to community boards.

2020 June

 Communications workshop - seven SLT attends telling effective stories to create calls to action.

2020 August

- DOC seed funding runs out. Waterways team contribute funds to continue coordinator programme until November 2020.
- Student leaders from three primary schools attend restoration workshop, then plan their own local planting events with wider school.
- Scott organises installation of a Litta Trap at Cashmere High School – passion project.
- Three HO students led 65 students in a half-day riparian planting at Centennial Park along the Waimokihi/Ōpāwaho/Heathcote.
- Three HO students teach weed ID to six other students then worked alongside contractors to remove weeds between the two ponds.
- Planting beside Cashmere Brook within (Cashmere High School) 30 August.
