

What is the Christchurch City Council?





The Christchurch City Council looks after the services that make Ōtautahi / Christchurch and Banks Peninsula a great place for everyone to live.



The Council looks after services like:



local roads and footpaths



- waste water what happens after you flush the toilet
- rubbish / recycling collection services.





like:



museums



pools



parks / reserves



playgrounds



sports fields



checking that food in cafes is safe

The Council also looks after services



- dog registration money that is paid by owners to the Council
- Civil Defence for example being ready if there is an earthquake or flooding.

Te Whakakitenga - Our Vision



Vision means looking at what the Christchurch City Council wants to see for the city in the years to come.



The vision for Ōtautahi / Christchurch and Banks Peninsula is:

Active and connected communities owning their own future.



Active / connected means people / services working well together.



Future means in the years to come.

Ngā Mātāpono – Principles and Values



Principles / values are ideas that are important to the way we:

- live our lives
- do our work.



The principles / values that are important to the work we do at the Christchurch City Council are:



- working in a way that follows Te
 Tiriti o Waitangi / Treaty of Waitangi
- thinking about future generations / people



 working in partnership with everyone.




Some more principles / values that are important to the work we do at the Christchurch City Council are:



 having good relationships with people



 working in a way that is inclusive across the whole Council





valuing people's:



- knowledge / things they know
- o skills.



Inclusive means to include everyone in decisions being made.







This whakataukī / proverb shows that Christchurch City Council understands the importance of:

- working in partnership with Ngāi
 Tahu Papatipu Rūnanga
- respecting Te Tiriti o Waitangi / Treaty of Waitangi.




Partnership means Māori and Christchurch City Council working together with other people in a way that supports Māori people.



Ngāi Tahu Papatipu Rūnanga represents 10 rūnanga / Māori groups in Canterbury.

What is the Strategy about?



This Easy Read document is a summary of Christchurch City Council's Strengthening Communities Together Strategy.



A summary:

- is shorter than the full report
- tells you the main ideas.



Strengthening means to make something stronger.



The **Strategy** is a plan of how to make Ōtautahi / Christchurch and Banks Peninsula a better place for everyone to live.



In this Easy Read document we will call the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy the **Strategy**.



The Strategy has been written around 4 **te pou / pillars** that show how the Council wants to work alongside the community over the next 10 years.



Te pou / pillars are like the groups of things the Council wants to see happen.



For Māori **pou** are pillars like upright poles of light that are used to keep the sky and earth separated.



By keeping them apart it means that:

- the natural world can flourish / grow
- people can prosper / do well.

The 4 Te Pou - Pillars



Te Pou Tuatahi – Pillar 1: Te Tāngata – People



In the Strategy pillar 1 is:

Actively promote a culture of equity by valuing diversity and fostering inclusion across communities and generations.



This means Christchurch City Council wants to see a community that **everyone** can be a part of:



- now
- in the future / years to come.







Te Pou Tuarua – Pillar 2: Te Whenua – Place

In the Strategy pillar 2 is:

Support and help build connections between communities to foster a sense of local identity, shared experiences and stewardship.

This means Christchurch City Council wants a community where everyone:

- feels like they belong
- shows kaitiakitanga / takes care of:
 - o places / spaces
 - o parks / land.





Te Pou Tuatoru - Pillar 3: Te Mahi - Participation

In the Strategy pillar 3 is:




Residents and groups in the wider community are socially and actively engaged and able to initiate and influence decisions affecting their lives.




This means Christchurch City Council wants a community where everyone:

- can have their say about decisions that are important in their community / where they live
- can understand the decisions that are made by Council.









In the Strategy pillar 4 is:

People feel safe in their communities and neighbourhoods and work together to understand, adapt and thrive in the context of change and disruption.





This means Christchurch City Council wants a community where everyone:

- is ready if there is an emergency like an earthquake or flooding
- plans for future changes
- supports connections between people in the area they live.

Whakatinanatanga – Implementation



Whakatinanatanga / implementation means how Christchurch City Council will do the things in the Strategy.



To implement the Strategy
Christchurch City Council will work in partnership with:



- the community
- key stakeholders
- organisations.



Key stakeholders are people / groups that have a lot of interest in the decisions that Council makes.











Christchurch City Council will:

- give updates at meetings that people go to
- have a community newsletter that shares the things they are working on
- collect data / information to show how things are going
- invite the community to share their stories about how they think things are going
- write an update every year of how things are going
- update the Strategy / implementation plan in 2027.


