When were trucks first used to collect rubbish and when were the oneman trucks first used please?





Council Response

Electric trucks, as opposed to horse drawn carts, were first used by Christchurch City Council to collect rubbish in 1915. According to the archived minutes of the Works & Sanitary Committee and Christchurch City Council the timeline is as follows:

- **11 March 1915** The committee begins to look at using 'electric dust carts'
- **8 April 1915** The committee considers the cost of using an 'electric motor' for rubbish collection
- 1 July 1915 The take up Mr Harris' offer for a 2-month trial of an electric truck
- **26 August 1915** The trial has been very successful, and they want to continue with the use of a truck
- 13 September 1915 It is tabled to Council with a thorough comparison between the cost of using a horse versus a truck
- **By 1920** It is also tabled to begin using electric trucks for nightsoil collection
- **By 1921** Trucks are being used between nightsoil and rubbish where needed and new trucks have arrived for nightsoil

Regarding the number of workers that these early trucks required, we do not appear to have any reference regarding how many men were employed per truck for rubbish removal. From the report tabled to Council on 13 September 1915, on the second page, it breaks down the costs per truck. This cost breakdown lists wages as £150. Looking at the Statistics Yearbook for the year 1915 for 'general labourer' this equates to the wages for one man. In response to your question regarding our current one-manned Waste Management trucks, Christchurch City Council have contracts for both side arm and rear loader trucks.

The side arm trucks are single-manned and include lifting arms. These were in place for the new kerbside collection service which began on 2 February 2009. This was when the 3 wheelie bins were introduced – see press releases at Expanded Christchurch Kerbside Service and Collection. These trucks eliminated the need for runners and sorters on trucks.

Christchurch City Council still utilises some of the smaller rear loader trucks. These trucks require two people to operate.

4. RESIGNATION OF MRS. HART. ATTENDANT AT LADIES CONVENIENCE.

Mrs. Hart, Attendant at the Ladies! Convenience has tendered her resignation, which has been accepted.

The Committee is calling for applications to fill the vacancy and requests authority to make an appointment.

5. SPENCE AND ARCHER STREETS.

The Committee has carefully considered Messrs. Maher's and Hopping's offer to give a strip of land 7 feet deep along their frontages for the purpose of widening the above streets and it cannot recommend the Council to comply with the request.

These private streets and the forming of them would materially enhance the value of the sections fronting thereon and the Committee is of opinion that the necessary expenditure

and the Committee is of opinion that the necessary expenditure should be borne by the owners of the land. If the owners are prepared to do the forming etc., to the satisfaction of the City Surveyor, the Committee would then favourably consider the question of taking the streets over.

"The following extracts from the Electrical Times will be "of interest:-

'The Electrical Times of February 18th,1915, states '(inter alia) that Mr. G.B.Tomes, Surveyor to "Barnes" was 'so satisfied with the working of two experiment electric 'vans for dust collection that he recommended the Council to adopt that method for dust collection. He estimated the saving effected by two electric vans as compared to horse work at £410 per annum.

'The same publication for May 20th, 1915, gives an account of a recent meeting of the Dover Town Council at which it was decided to purchase six electrically driven wagons for the collection of house refuse. The vehicles are to be equipped with Edison Accumulators and will have a capacity of two tons, tipping being

'operated automatically.

"At this meeting the Mayor stated that the saving 'would be £1400 per annum over a present expenditure of

£7000.

Re/to the Motor Truck.

In my opinion the Edison storage battery as installed in the truck we have been using for rubbish is in perfect runing order. This battery has some failings, one of the most important is that in other localities, (it does not apply here), where there is severe cold weather it will not give the mileage. The cold weather experienced here is not sufficient to make any trouble whatsoever. In comparison with the lead storage battery I deem the life to be from three to five times as long.

The cost of the replacement of the lead battery would be a new battery after three years use and as far as I can see the Edison battery will not have to be replaced before 12 or 15 years. The only thing that can happen to this battery is due to outside accidents which might mean the replacement of one or more of the cells, beyond this I do not anticipate any trouble provided it is given the ordinary attention in charging and in

4. AMENDMENTS TO "THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT".

The Departmentof Public Health (44894) has written The Departmenter Fabric health (49004) has written stating that it is proposed to introduce extensive alterations in Public Health Legislation during the coming season tions in Public Health Legislation during the coming season of Parliament if possible, and asking whether, for the sake of simplifying legislation it would not be better to remove from "The Municipal Corporations Act" all sections dealing with sanitary measures and embody them solely in "The Public "Health Act"; also stating that it has been suggested in regard to the investigation and prevention of infectious disease that the powers at present in the hands of Hasnital disease that the powers at present in the hands of Hospital Boards should be re-transferred to Local Authorities.

The Committee recommends that the Department be informed that the Council is of opinion that the simpler method would be to group into one amendment in "The Municipal Corporations" Act" all the powers possessed by a Borough relating to the

The Committee is also of opinion that the question of . prevention of infectious diseases should be left in the hands of Hospital Boards or the Public Health Department made responsible, and Inspectors for this purpose should have authority to investigate with a view to tracing the critical source of an infectious disease. This cannot always be done by the City Inspectors whose authority ceases at the City

The Committee is of opinion that the condemnation of The Committee is of opinion that the condemnation of insanitary buildings should be placed entirely in the hands of either the Public Health Department of the Municipalities, the former for preference, but in any case the authority should not be divided as at present.

WORKS AND SANITARY COMMITTEE'S REPORT WORKS AND DREETHER O REPORT

1. HEAVY TRAFFIC:

A Deputation from the Waimairi County Council waited

on the Committee at its last meeting with reference to

Traction Engine Traffic. The Deputation stated that the Waimairi County Council

had recently spent £1000 in carrying out repairs to the mad recently open and pointed out that the Traction Engines were already considerably damaging the tarred macadam top of the already considerably damaging the license fee of £15 charged by the Council should be considerably increased and apportioned amongst the several adjoining Local Authorities.

The Committee is of opinion that a Conference of Local Bodies adjacent to the City should be held with a

view to coming to some arrangement.

REMOVAL OF NIGHTSOIL:

The Electric trucks for the removal of nightsoil have arrived. Wooden bodies will have to be built and a metal tank provided to carry the nightsoil. The Committee recommends that tenders te invited for carrying out this work, The estimated cost is £440. The money is payable out of Loan but the loan has not yet been realised. The work is of such an urgent nature that it cannot stand over.

3. ELECTRIC TRUCK USED FOR COLLECTION OF REFUSE:

This truck has been in constant use since July, 1915, and has been subject to very severe trials, especially when it was used for demonstration purposes. It is now necessary to overhaul the battery and replace any dead cells, the total cost being estimated at £330. The Committee recommends that the Electricity Department be requested to do the work.

The truck has travelled 29,033 miles and the total running cost including interest and depreciation, works out at 17.05 pence per mile which is considered very satisfactory.

4. DUPLICATION OF TRAWNAY TRACKS - BEALEY AVENUE:

The Tramway Board intends to lay another line in Bealey Avenue and wishes to alter the kerbing and side channel at the corner of Bealey Avenue and Colombo Street and Bealey Avenue and Barbadoes Street to correspond with the curve of the Tramway Track, and the Sub-Committee has approved of the alterations being made.

5. CONDUCT OF EMPLOYEES:

The Committee ragrets that complaints have been received regarding the frequenting of hotels and drinking by employees during working hours.

Notices have been placed in the several yards stating that any employee found under the influence of liquor during working hours will be instantly dismissed.

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CITY SURVEYOR'S REPORT TO THE WORKS COMMITTEE.

TECTRIC MOTOR FOR DUST COLLECTION:

Mr. Stark estimates the cost of a three ton truck at £1350 and 2/- per day for the cost of power. It is difficult to say what the saving in cost of collection would be until a trial was made under the new conditions, but as 50% of the time in the suburbs is now taken in travelling with small loads I am of opinion that at least 50% will be saved on each cart at present at work. As a three tow truck would probably do the work of three drays the saving should be at least equal to the wages of three men, say £420 per annum. As against this there would be the cost of interest sinking fund and depreciation on a much greater/expenditure of £2350 as against £224, but even making full allowance for this there should be a considerable saving.



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"ADVERTISING CARS." COUNCILLOR SCOTT AND ELECTRICAL ENGINEER.

ALLEGATIONS REPEATED.

▲ CHORUS OF PROTEST.

Mayor last night, "to a statement made in open Council a fortnight ago by Councillor Scott. I do not suppose that Councillor Scott meant it when he said that the engineer had no time to give him a report he had asked for, and yet had time to go about selling metor-cars. A good many citizens think it strange that we should employ an officer for that purpose, and I think the statement has done harm."

"I said advertising motor-cars," said Councillor G. Scott, "and I still stick to that."

"ADVERTISING CARS."

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"I do not think advertising motorcars is quite the proper expression," said Councillor A. S. Taylor, chairman of the Electricity Committee. "The committee and the Council are er deavouring to make use of the current during the night hours by establishing a trade in charging electric vehicles, and with that end in view he should be glad to see one or two firms getting a start, especially in carrying vehicles. In Chicago a large number are being used. However, I will not labour that point. With that end in view, I know the engineer has tried to influence several firms in that direction. The only electric vehicle in Christchurch is an Edison storage bactery truck, which is now being tested as a rubbish cart, but as the result of the interest raised in it one other firm is ordering an electric motor-car, not from that company, but from Australia. We are merely advertising our desire to push on our business."

"I think." replied Councillor Scott, "that the engineer has plenty of work to do without advertising these things. I know of one firm he approached, and in fact several of them, and in one case he was ordered out of the room."

The electrical engineer, who was present during the discussion, rose apparently to contradict this statement, but

"I think he has pienty of work to do," continued Councillor Scott, "instead of running about selling a motorcar for the sake of getting a few units of current sold. I think it is quite out of place. If you want those motorcars on the market get an agent to do it and not an engineer. An engineer getting a salary like he is getting should not have done it. When we are told by him that £150,000 will not complete the work, and when we have only £125,000 voted at the present time, he should be at home studying his work instead of trying to increase the sale of a motor car."

Councillor D. G. Sullivan said that Councillor Scott had spoken in the most severe terms of the engineer, who could not reply; but even if he had made an attempt to do business along the lines suggested he had acted, he was certain in accordance with what he deemed to be the interests of his department. He would like to know from the chairman if the engineer had been engaged on the work without the committee's knowledge.

"Councillor Scott knows as well as the other members of the committee," said Councillor Taylor, "that the engineer reported on this matter of electric traction and the committee approved of it. Councillor Scott knows that the more we can fill up that night load the better we shall be off. I know that the very high load factor in Christchurch is the subject of great admiration from engineers in other parts of New Zealand. I am sure the engineer was acting with the idea of introducing one or two of these vehicles to get the thing started."

"I must emphatically protest." said Councillor Hayward "against the in-

terpretation placed on the engineer's action. I do not think it is tan, because the engineer has no right of rep.y. As a member of the committee I consider the engineer has worked very hard and strenuously to put the thing on a solid footing, particularly when you take into consideration the posi-tion in which he found the system. This misinterpretation of the action of an energetic employee is greatly to be deplored, and he should be protected against it."

"I am amazed at Councillor Scott's statement," said Councillor H. F. Herbert. "He seems to use every means in his power to discredit our engineer; not only Mr Stark, but the late engineer, who was not capable according to Councillor Scott, and now he charges Mr Stark with going round and selling motor-cars. I protest against this going out to the public. The words used have already done much harm, and it is a shame to make such statements be-

fore inquiring into the matter."
Courcillor J. O. Jameson said that he had every confidence in the ability and integrity of the engineer. He had sat next to Councillor Scott at the previous meeting and could certify that he had said "selling cars," not adver-

tising them.

The Mayor said that in mentioning the matter he had thought that Counc'llor Scott in the heat of debate had let slip the statement withcat a thought. It seemed to be a serious charge to make against a responsible officer, and he had hoped that Councillor Scott would withdraw or modify it.

- "I do not intend to modify it," said Conneillor Scott. "and I can bring evidence to substantiate what I have sa;4.''
- "I protest," soid Chuncillor J. Revnolds, "noninst Commil'or Scott's notion at the last meeting, when he denied making an attack on the engineer. It would be interesting to know what isnemace he would use when he was really making an attack on a person."

ABATTOIR AND RESERVES COM-MITTEE.

The Abattoir and Reserves Committee reported that the painting of the mortuary chapel and the waiting-room at the Sydenham Cemetery had been completed, and a new cattle-proof fence erected on the eastern side of the approach to the cemetery. rails had been fixed at the places where wneel traffic made a practice of taking short cuts under the trees in Bealey Avenue. Soil was being prepared for top-dressing some of the bare parts in Sydenham Park, and a good dressing of artificial manure would be given before the winter set in. The head gardener had made arrangements to assis: lifting and re-laying the turf the electric underground cable Rabbits across the park. a considerable amount doing damage to some of the trees on the Bottle Lake Reserve, and the committee recommended that rabbit-proof netting should be hung on the fence that surrounded the recently planted part. This would more than save one year's planting, and would last for several years.

ELECTRICITY COMMITTEE

CITY COUNCIL.

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The Electric Light and Power Committee reported that, with a view to an earlier supply to the Sydenham district from the Sydenham Park sub-station, arrangements with the Government for the supply of energy from the overhead lines to the district of Cashmere had been completed, and also with the Waterworks Department for the transformer station to be located within the pumping station building. A start had been made on the connecting line, together with the lay-out for transformer and switch device. direct current supply to the district was already very much overloaded Work had been started on the Sydenham sub-station supply feeder, and was expected to be finished in a few days. The Department had tested a large number of both D.C. and A.C. meters. and installed 107 D.C. and 37 A.C. meters. In addition, 261 maximum demand indicators had been tested and 45 installed.

The electrical engineer had obtained permission to purchase the following quantities of cable as a temporary supply, pending the arrival of cable under contract:--Silvertown Rubber Company -Six miles of 7-18 at £28 per mile, six miles of 7-16 at £42 15s per mile: Brown Bros.-Ten miles of 7-20 at £18 per mile, nine miles of 7-18 at £29 8 per mile: National E. and E. Company -Five miles of 7-18 at £28 10s per mile, four miles of 7-16 at £43 12s per mile. During the past fortnight twentyone new service connections had been made. Mains had been erected in Montreal Street South and on both sides of Bealey Avenue from east to west. Five steel poles had been purchased from the Tramway Board at £11 each to complete the lighting in Cathedral Square. The Board's stock of brackets had also been purchased at £1 each. The committee had much pleasure in stating that the service from Lake Coleridge was giving every satisfaction. The electrical engineer reported that the service was remarkably steady, and so far the best that he had met with in his experience.

The report was adopted.

RUBBISH COLLECTION TRUCK.

The Works and Sanitary Committee reported that the electrical engineer es-

timated the cost of a onfection of deal for rubbish collection at £1350, and it could be run at 2s per day for power. The City Surveyor stated that it would be difficult to say what the saving in cost of collection would be until a trial had been made, but as 50 per cent of me time in the suburbs was now taken in travelling to and from the Destructor, he was of opinion that a considerable saving would be made on each cart at present at work. A three-ton truck would probably do the work of three drays, and the Surveyor estimated the saving at about £420 per annum. Against this would have to be set the interest, sinking fund and depreciation on the capital cost of £1350, but, making full allowance for this, there should be a considerable annual saving on one truck. The committee recommended the council to place a sum on the estimates for the purchase of a truck during the current year. Tenders should be invited as quickly as possible, as it would take several months before a truck could be brought into operation. The committee had written to the Public Works Department calling attention to the unsatisfactory manner in which the surfaces of electric cable trenches had been left.

The report was adopted.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The By-laws Committee reported that the portion of North Avon Road from Dudley Creek northwards had been named North Parade. The Public Works Department had agreed to the exemption of Short Street from the provisions of the Act in relation to the building line. As the result of representations to the police, thirty-one conbeen secured against had victions using the pathway through cyclists Cranmer and Latimer Squares.

The tender of E. J. Ruddick at £75 was accepted for entrance gates at

Beckenham Park.

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ELECTRIC TRACTION.

THE TWO-TON RUBBISH TRUCK

A MONEY-SAVING PURCHASE.

The Works Committee recommended the C.ty Council last night to purchase the two-ton Edison storage battery truck, which has been on trial for nearly two months, as a rubbish collector. The price quoted by the owners, Harris and Co., is £915 with a tipping body, which has yet to be fitted.

The city surveyor reported that the truck had been doing the work of two rubbish collecting drays at St Albans, and of six drays in running longer distances to the marram grass reserve, making the trip at ten miles an hour. For carting blinding and clitiker from the destructor it would easily do the work of four or five drays. If engaged on work where it was only doing the work of two drays it would lead to an annual saving of £35, and on the work of three drays £284, with a rapidly increasing saving if Jused on long distances and filled rapidly.

Estimates were put in by the electrical engineer that the electric waggon would cost £363 a year, and by the city surveyor that two dravs would cost £398, or three drays £597.
